Greetings from the President



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
Dear Reader:

TBIPS CURRICULUM

TBIPS recognizes that, because many people come to us suffering from the Trauma of childhood abuse and/or other horrific events or from the relational trauma of chronic misattunement and misrecognition, our curriculum must weave into it a deep understanding of child development, attachment, and the effects of trauma. Semesters currently run 16 weeks long. Courses are open to individual students as well as to candidates experiencing full psychoanalytic training. TBIPS invites candidates to frequently update the syllabi.

All Courses meet for 16 Wednesdays: Sep 19, 26; Oct 3, 10, 17, 24, 31; Nov 7, 14, 28; Dec 5, 12, 19, 2018; Jan 2, 9, 16, 2019 <u>Registration deadline is August 1, 2018</u> and includes a subscription to PEP (psychoanalytic electronic publishing).

Developmental Issues: Narcissism and the Development of Shame Throughout the Life Cycle Wednesdays 8:00am-9:15am This course offers a contemporary understanding of narcissism, both its developmentally appropriate and pathological aspects, with an emphasis on its primary affect (shame) and on helping the clinician to avoid engendering shame in the therapeutic situation. It includes discussion of envy and rage and deficits in mentalization. We emphasize recognition, containment, empathy and mirroring.

<u>Clinical Case Conference</u> Wednesdays 9:30am-10:45pm This course is designed to support the clinician's work and offers opportunities to integrate clinical material with psychoanalytic concepts, including ethics, and ways to deepen the psychoanalytic process, with a focus on the therapist's self reflection, the clinical relationship, and ways to facilitate what is mutative for the patient. Attendees are encouraged to present case material.

<u>Relational Concepts and Methodology I</u> Wednesdays 11:00am-12:15am This course is designed to elucidate some of the differences between classical and postclassical psychoanalytic thinking. We will compare assumptions about the mind, compare ideas about clinical process, and consider how relationship is built, maintained, and repaired. With an emphasis on the analyst's self reflection we will explore how we locate ourselves in the therapeutic process.

Disclosure:

An interesting paper (1993) of hers talks about the analyst's emotions and whether, and when, to share them with the patient. Some of the benefits which may be gleaned by sharing the analyst's feelings about the patient include:

they may evoke from the patient additional, illuminating data;

they may allow the patient to feel he or she has an impact;

they may de-mystify the interaction;

they may communicate the analyst's dedication to the analytic process;

they may be taken as expressing a sense of caring, even if they are negative emotions; they may generate new experiences: new emotions, and that emotions can be explored; they may convey that the analyst can survive [Winnicott: survival];

they convey respect, acknowledging the patient's responsibility for her/his impact on the analyst;

they may relieve the analyst of interference from unexpressed negative feelings;

they may acquaint the patient with her/his potential for affective interchanges;


they may acquaint the patient with the joy of *mutual* regulation rather than control imposed by the other;

they may allow the patient to vicariously experience forbidden affects which the analyst carries for both;

They may communicate to the patient the therapist's involvement;

the patient may be better able to explore intolerable feelings with an emotionally responsive person;

[and may foster authenticity and intersubjectivity, of which emotions are a part]



Film: The Shape of Water

Reportedly inspired by *Creature from the Black Lagoon*, with the wish that this time the monster gets the girl, Guillermo del Toro said *The Shape of Water* (2017) is "a movie in love with love and in love with cinema... [it is] a musical, a thriller, a comedy." Co-written with Vanessa Taylor and directed by del Toro it won Best Picture and Best Director, rivaling *Three Billboards* for these awards. Not so dark as *Pan's Labyrinth*, but a fairytale nonetheless, this, like many fairytales, is a heterosexual love story, set not in Spain following its Civil War but in Baltimore during the Cold War when the USA was in a space race with Russia. The soundtrack (winning Best Original Score), like the amphibious creature, is magical. It transports you, sometimes deliriously, from scene to scene with a smile.

While a twist on Disney's *The Little Mermaid* ---- it is the male creature who lives in the water, and the female who is mute ---- still, it is the woman who must follow the male creature to his world. In this love story, love is about recognition. Elisa (Sally Hawkins) says, via sign language, about the creature (Doug Jones), "When he looks at me he doesn't know how I am incomplete. He sees me as I am." The director del Toro said, "Stories help us heal." This story is also about the magic of love to heal. del Toro said "When we admit love exists and is the most powerful force in the universe...it's like water and it has no shape until it takes it."

del Toro and Taylor speak to the sexual harassment of women in low paying jobs, and of people without a voice, and they paint their villain as characteristically sadistic. But we know that ordinary men need not be so wholly villainous to want their women silent. The co-writers also give a nod to the homophobia and racism of 1962 but we know that these heinous creatures still exist today. del Toro wants lines that have been drawn in the sand to be erased: "The other has always been us."

VETERANS' FAMILY INITIATIVE (VFI):



An Outreach Program of TBIPS

The mission of VFI arose from the need to help address with family members of veterans some of the difficulties with re- connecting as a family after separations and long absences, and in dealing with possible disabilities or illness of the veterans.

VFI (Veterans' Family Initiative) is one of the community outreach pro- grams of T-BIPS (Tampa Bay Institute for Psychoanalytic Studies). This pro bono/ low fee program was established to serve family members (spouses and children) of veterans who served in Afghanistan or Iraq by offering low to no cost mental health psychotherapy services. Volunteers are licensed psychologists, mental health counselors, social workers, and psychiatrists like you from the Tampa Bay area who have volunteered their time to talk with veterans' spouses, children, couples, or family.

Volunteers provide psychotherapeutic services to family members who are interested in talking to a mental health professional and who are not already in therapy. The mental health clinician meets with a spouse, child, adolescent, couple, or family, on a weekly basis for little or no fee. All particulars are negotiated by you and the patient.

Volunteers do not work for or act on behalf of TBIPS, and TBIPS is not responsible for overseeing your work or its outcome. TBIPS' limited role is to connect potential patients with volunteers, and to coordinate and support the independent clinicians (by arranging peer consultation groups) who have so generously offered their services for the benefit of veterans' families.

As it will be helpful in the development of this program to learn what services families find most useful, VFI asks the volunteer therapist to report to VFI demographics (such as a child's age or that a spouse was seen). No names or other confidential information will be reported.

Treatment is strictly confidential, except as required by law to report elder or child abuse, domestic violence or any imminent danger to patients or others.

Mobius Strip Logo



Ehrenberg wrote that the analytic dialogue, including intersubjective experience, where transference is not separate from countertransference, requires "something like turning our experience 'inside out'—opening ... the 'internal boundary' of the relationship and explicating our experience from inside. "

TBIPS chose as its logo the mobius strip (a common symbol for the interconnectedness of things and for infinity) because its inside and outside are inextricably connected. Just as the inside and outside worlds of human experience are contextualized in one another, the past always contextualized in the present, the present in the past, and foreground experience always embedded in background relationship and meaning, so, too, the analytic dialogue has no 'inside' and no 'outside.'

TRAINING Psychoanalytic courses and certificate programs offered.

Self Psychological and Self-Intersubjective Psychoanalysis Study Group: Colleagues discuss the latest articles in Self psychology and self (Systems theory) Intersubjectivity on the first and third Fridays of every month, September though June.

SERVICE

Veterans Family Initiative (VFI): Inspired by the American Psychoanalytic Associa- tion's SOFAR program, VFI offers pro bono or very low fee treatment to families of vet- erans of the Afghani and Iraqi conflicts. We have over a dozen dedicated and generous mental health clinicians around Tampa Bay from amongst our ranks who volunteer. You may volunteer, too.
